In 2009 Jim created the High Country Land Managers' Carbon Project, which was launched at Ben Avon Station. This project was born from concerns he had about the profitability of farming in the high country. In 2012 Jim was recognised with a Queens Service Medal, for services to the community including raising more than \$200,000 for charity - in particular the Cancer Society and Age Concern. #### **Meet: Jim Morris**

I met Jim at the recent Tarras CD Club dog trials and it was suggested I talk to him for this edition of TT. I asked this humble, soft-spoken gentleman what had made his life so interesting? He didn't tell me much, rather laughing at my use of the word interesting, but Google (and some of his friends) did!! There is so much to this man, that TT does not have enough room to share it all. Ever since he was a young nipper, Jim has enjoyed writing poetry. Throughout his life, his love of the high country and the written word has taken him many places, and has included publishing a book entitled "Different Worlds" Backcountry Yarns. Jim has used sales from his book to fundraise for charities. Its available at the Tarras Merino shop, and its well worth the money. Jims words so accurately describe life on land. It's a 10/10.

Jim and Mary Ann moved to Tarras 7 years ago, in retirement. Together they own 50 acres of land, 40 of which is planted in lucerne and the remaining 10, has a variety of uses, including providing extra grazing for neighbour's stock. The move to Tarras was inspired by the number of people they already knew here. Jim reckons the climate in Tarras is spot on, but admits a little more rain would be nice. And he adds" the best thing about Tarras is how friendly the natives are". "What's the worst thing about Tarras" I asked him. Jim had to think for quite a while before coming up with - "that jolly main road". LOLs Jim fills his days helping his neighbours around their farms doing a bit of whatever needs doing. In his spare time (and I think the word 'spare' is used loosely), Jim likes to go to their crib in Ben Avon for a bit of a break, or else you can find him at Haast, fishing.

Originally Jim hails from the Canterbury region. At one time owning Manuka Point Station where he ran mainly sheep and beef. Jim has previously trialled his working dogs but not this year. In 1988 Jim bought the 25000-acre lease of Ben Avon in the Ahuriri Valley. Jim was on the station for 30 years before selling to The Lindis Group. Jim saw the Ben Avon run through land tenure review when it decreased in size to 6500 acres of freehold land, with the reminder placed into DOC estate. Jim has always adopted a low impact approach to farming, to limit any negative environmental impacts.

Jim has always had a love of Clydesdale horses. His grandfather, had a stud in Dargaville and Clydesdales were used on the property until 1960. Jim attended the Royal Highland Show in Scotland, the home of the Clydesdale, in 1995. Jim has owned and judged Clydesdales throughout the country and has also served as President of the Clydesdale Horse Society of NZ. You can read more here:
