

"Why go to Paris – when you can go to Tarras"

Alice Casey is the new Principal at Tarras School. She grew up in Forest Hill, just out of Invercargill with 2 brothers, 1 sister and she currently has 9 nieces/nephews.

At 18, Alice moved to New York to be a Nanny. Her first position was 6 months looking after 2 boys – 6yrs and 4 yrs old, one who was autistic. After finishing her Nanny stint, she travelled widely through the US, before deciding to return home as she missed her family. Back in Invercargill she studied beauty therapy with nursing papers, then teaching. She spent 4 years at Otatara Primary School.

Alice's family have always been very altruistic with her Mum volunteering for Orphans Aid in Invercargill for 12 years; doing everything including supporting 2 orphanages in Kolkata and Romania. Alice has travelled to Romania to visit the orphanage and has helped with many projects while there; from taking the children on outings, to organising a shop, and helping source furniture and equipment. When back in NZ and working at Limehills school, Alice got her students involved in the Dress a Girl project where they sewed dresses for the girls and shorts for the boys which were sent to the orphanages. The travel bug had her, so she left and headed for the UK. Alice loved the UK, as people there were easy to get along with, and travel was cheap. Alice started teaching for an Academy, that had 5 schools with 48 teachers in total. They were in one of the poorest areas in the UK and problems within the school were rife. Many of the children were travellers' children. The longest any teacher had stayed at any of the schools was 6 months- until Alice arrived. She stayed for 4.5 years and was given the role of English lead, across all 5 schools. The school terms were - 6 weeks teaching and 2 weeks off. Alice spent every 2-week block exploring different countries in Europe. There are 50 countries in Europe and Alice has visited 48 of them. She has still to visit Siberia and Russia.

- When travelling, Alice's favourite country for the people was Turkey (she got 5 marriage proposals on her 1st day, as the men loved her beautiful complexion and blonde hair - all affectionately calling her "Lamb Chop!")
- Her favourite country for the scenery was Iceland, especially the auroras.
- Π Her least favourite country was Albania.

After 4.5 yrs in the UK, Alice returned to Invercargill due to family illness. Her intention was to return and live in the UK – but Covid trapped her in Invercargill. Alice grew settled during lockdown, and the wanderlust was packed away. Now, we welcome Alice to Tarras. She chose to apply for the role here as the feel of, and being part of, a community is important to her. Her family have a saying for her - "Why go to Paris – when you can go to Tarras" LOL
